# Weekly Words from The Rock

Christmas Season Trivia

Over the next weeks, we will look at 10 questions from the Christmas season. The answers to the questions can be found in Matthew's Gospel chapters 1 and 2 or Luke's Gospel chapters 1 and 2. So pull out your Bibles and let us get to work.

Question 1: In Matthew's Gospel how many generations are recorded between Abraham and the Messiah?

Answer: 42

Question 2: How many gifts did the Wise Men bring to Jesus?

Answer: 3

Question 3: In the accounts of Jesus' birth how many visits from the angels are there?

Answer: 6

Question 4: How many months did Mary stay with her cousin Elizabeth while they were both pregnant? Answer: 3

Question 5: How old was Anna the prophetess? Answer: 84

Here are the next three questions:

Question 1: How many months had Elizabeth been pregnant when the angel appeared to Mary?

Question 2: How many different names are given to Jesus in these passages?

Question 3: How many times do angels say "Do not be afraid"?

I will give the answers next week. (Please note: The questions and answers are being taken from the website Catholic Culture).

Extra Credit Christmas Season Question: Last week, I asked the following question: In his passion for ice fishing, did Father Schuster ever drop his pickup into a lake trying to get to a favorite ice fishing hole during a previous Christmas season? Answer: It depends what you mean by "dropping his pickup into a lake". If by the phrase you mean completely submerged, the answer is "No". However, I did drop the front of my pickup into the lake on one occasion. I don't remember the year but here is the story. I headed out fishing on a Monday of the Christmas season. I followed the tracks of other vehicles who had traveled the route previously. I came to an ice heave and apparently (or maybe I should say obviously) there had been enough wind to weaken one side of the ice heave. Driving over the ice heave, the front end of my pickup fell in at a 45 degree angle. Fortunately, the pickup frame caught on the ice heave so no other part of the pick could fall in. I called my father who brought the tractor. There was enough ice on the lake to drive the tractor out on the ice. He hooked onto my pickup and pulled me out.

After that, I took the pickup home and looked at the damage. The only thing broken was my fog light assembly on the right side of the pickup. Outside of that, no dings or breaks. What did I do? I drove right back out to the lake, crossed the ice heave a bit closer to shore and fished. I did leave the pickup running to keep ice from accumulating around the bottom part of the engine compartment which had fallen into the lake. When I got back to the parish that night, having a heated garage, I turned up the furnace and let the pickup dry out.

One might think such an episode would keep me from driving on a lake again but it didn't. I still do, although I try to be careful where I drive. All in the search for a fish!
