Weekly Words from The Rock

The Punishment of Hell

Question: Many who might otherwise accept God's punishment of sinners are still dismayed that hell is eternal. Why should one be punished eternally for sins committed over brief time spans, perhaps in just a moment? The punishment does not seem to fit the crime.

Answer: The view presumes that the eternal nature of hell is due to the punishment, but it is not. Rather, hell is eternal because repentance is no longer available after death. Our decision for or against God and the values of his kingdom becomes forever fixed. Because at this point the will is fixed and obstinate, the repentance that unlocks mercy will never be forthcoming.

St. Thomas Aquinas teaches: "After their fall the angels could not be restored (cf. Summa I:64:2). Therefore, neither can man after death and thus the punishment of the damned will have no end...So just as the demons are obstinate in wickedness and therefore have to be punished for ever, so too are the souls of men who die without charity" (Summa Theologica, Supplement, Question 99, Article 3).

Some argue that the souls in hell do regret their sins and that, in the parables Jesus often depicts them as seeking entrance to heaven after the doors have been closed. Still, it remains a teaching that, after death, repentance in the formal sense is not possible. Here, too, St. Thomas distinguishes formal repentance from incidental repentance and explains: "A person may repent of sin in two ways: in one way directly, in another way indirectly. He repents of a sin directly who hates sin as such, and he repents indirectly who hates it on account of something connected to it, for instance punishment or something of that kind.

Accordingly, the wicked will not repent of their sins directly, because consent in the malice of sin will remain in them; but they will repent indirectly, inasmuch as they will suffer from the punishment inflicted on them for sin" (Summa Theologica, Supplement, Question 98, Article 2).

This explains the "wailing and grinding of teeth" in so far as it points to the lament of the damned. They do not lament their choice to sin without repenting, but for the consequences. In the parable of Lazarus, the rich man laments his suffering but expresses no regret over the way he treated Lazarus. Indeed, he still sees Lazarus as a kind of errand-boy, who should fetch him water and warn his brothers. In a certain sense, the rich man cannot repent, his character is now quickened and his choices forever fixed.

A really great question popped up during the Synod discussions—

What all does a liturgist do to prepare for a weekend Mass? I'll try to answer this question over the next couple of weeks. This week, we'll look at the very beginning of the process. (To explain as best I can, let's plan the liturgy for February 27, the 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time.)

The very first thing I do is reflect on the various prayers and readings assigned for that day. Part of this process is a self-reflection, but I also take time to read suggestions through workbooks like Living Liturgy, the book we have available for parishioners. There are lots of ideas in these books, including discussion questions, connections to the Gospel, homily points, and thoughts on the liturgy.

From all this information, I come up with one or two points to emphasize. For the 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time, I find the readings focus on living as Christ's disciples through word and deed by staying rooted in devotion to him. As I go forward, then, everything I plan will have this thought in mind.

For Advent and Lent, a lot of times I'll have a central idea for the entire season to help us enter even deeper into prayer. This Lent, for instance, we'll be focusing on the Eucharist. By approaching the readings with the Eucharist in mind, I'll certainly be emphasizing very different points from the readings we heard in previous years. This is to me one of the most beautiful things about liturgy. To see what I mean, look at the readings for the 8th Sunday and see what you would emphasize.


