"Then he took the bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body, which will be given for you; do this in memory of me.' And likewise the cup after they had eaten, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which will be shed for you.'" Luke 22:19-20

In ancient times, there were many forms of sacrifice, like gift offerings, shared offerings, and sin offerings. The sacrifice you all probably know is Passover, the passing over of Yahweh and ultimately the Israelites' last meal in Egypt. This Passover meal was a time to remember and to relieve the exodus. It begins with a prayer of thanksgiving, followed by readings, the meal offering of lamb, wine, and unleavened bread, and lastly a psalm of praise and final prayer.

Knowing this, it's even clearer to notice the significant changes Jesus made during the Last Supper. First, Jesus washed the disciples' feet, reminding us to serve one another. Secondly, he offered his Body and Blood in the form of bread and wine for our salvation. Lastly, Jesus told us that he is "the new covenant" with us.

We could (and should) spend our whole lives talking about the importance and immense joy we find through these three points. This Lent, I encourage you to do just that. Participate in the Eucharist videos and talks with us, play a video on [formed.org](https://www.formed.org), or read a text that focuses on the Eucharist. Take this time to enter more actively into this saving memorial so that we might truly understand and relive Christ's sacrifice for us.

On Monday, March 14th, the children will not have class at 6:00pm because we will be praying the Stations of the Cross with our families at 5:30pm in the Church.

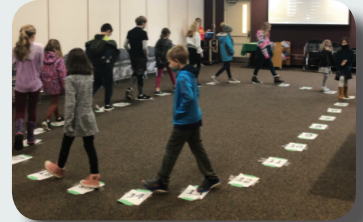


Totus Tuus 2022: The Team will be at here Monday, June 27-Friday, July 1st.

Teaching Kids to Care by Practicing Virtues: We will spend the spring and summer months talking about virtues with the assistance of a catechist book by Sr. Janet Schaeffler, OP. Let's learn about the virtue of courtesy this week. Courtesy is polite and considerate behavior that shows respect for other people. Practicing courtesy gives children a deeper appreciation of and respect for themselves and others.



Everything we do has an impact on others. For children, we can talk about practicing manners, like saying please and thank you, not interrupting when someone else is talking, taking turns on the playground, or waiting for our turn without complaining. We can teach courtesy to our children by providing them a variety of experiences. Then they will begin to know how to show courtesy of others at a restaurant, at a playground, at a concert, in a museum, in the classroom, and at Mass. Courtesy is an attitude of the heart that is self-giving. "Finally, be all like-minded, compassionate, loving, tenderhearted, courteous." (1 Peter 3:8)

Prayer for the virtue of courtesy: God of kindness and consideration, we bring your love to our world when we act as you would, when we act as Jesus did. Help us to see you in each person, treating them with compassion, courtesy, and consideration. *Amen*

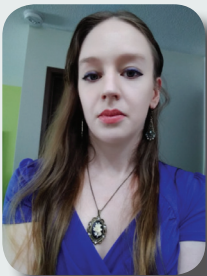
THE RITE OF ELECTION AND CALL TO CONTINUING CONVERSION
