- C. Chasuble

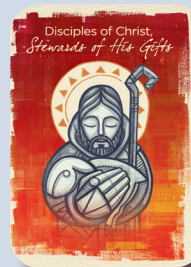

I am always blown away when learning about the deep devotion the saints have to Christ. Take St. Ignatius of Antioch, for instance. While traveling in chains to Rome to be devoured by beasts for his faith, St. Ignatius wrote letters to communities pleading they do nothing to prevent him from suffering an agonizing death for Christ. Listen to what he says in his letter to the Romans: "I am corresponding with all the churches and bidding them all realize that I am voluntarily dying for God — if, that is, you do not interfere. Let me be fodder for wild beasts — that is how I can get to God. I am God's wheat and I am being ground by the teeth of wild beasts to make a pure loaf for Christ."

It's clear that St. Ignatius understood the phrase we commonly hear as "offer it up." Sacrificing our free time to help others or giving up meat on Fridays doesn't make a difference to our salvation, or anyone else's for that matter—that is, it doesn't until we place it on the altar of Christ. All those sacrifices we "offer up" to Christ become part of Christ's sacrifice, which are then capable of participating in the salvation of the world.

We're meant to join in Christ's self-giving. We're meant to join our whole lives to him, to live Eucharistic lives. Just as St. Ignatius and all the saints chose to offer their lives to Christ in their own ways, so let us join our offerings to Jesus so that he can offer them to the Father for the salvation of the world.

**Teaching Kids to Care by Practicing Virtues:** Empathy is our virtue to learn about and practice this week.

"Empathetic children are not only conscious of others' feeling, they can also see themselves as capable of doing something to alleviate others' suffering. Praise your child when he or she shows concern for another. Point out their friends' feeling and suggest how they could help in some way." Another way to build empathy— whenever we begin to make a judgment about someone (negative or positive), add the phrase "just like me." For example, "she is so selfish, just like me"; or "he is so generous, just like me." It helps us understand who others are feeling and to look at things from their perspective.

**Pray for Empathy:** *God of all, sometimes I want to be with people who look like me, act like me, and think like me. Yet you've created us as one family, one remarkable family with many differences. You call us to live in community. Deepen our empathy, our ways of feeling with others, of understanding each one and appreciating the beauty of all. Amen.*
