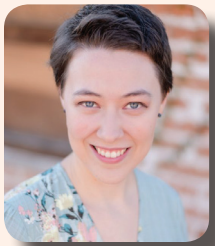

The Eucharist is the very heart of the universe. Everything we do should draw us toward it, for it is through the Eucharist that we are invited and encouraged to offer ourselves, our labors, and all created things, together with God. And as we offer our whole lives, they come together to what we call the summit, where they can be transformed into the true worship that makes them and gives them value. Our lives, through that participation, become Eucharistic. Now, many Catholics believe our first priority is to receive the Eucharist. While this might seem correct on the surface, our first duty is to exercise our baptismal priesthood. When we are baptized, we receive a character, or a permanent mark on our souls at baptism, one that will never be lost. It forever marks us as belonging to God, as a priest who's able to make an offering of our lives like Christ's life for the salvation of the world.

Just as Jesus lived his priesthood as an offering for us, our first priority is to make offerings of ourselves like Christ when we see the Holy Eucharist. Paul writes this in his letter to the Romans: "I urge you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, your spiritual worship" (12:1). We are the new temple or body of Christ, so we should offer ourselves in union with his priesthood.

This is why the Church stresses that all the faithful should actively participate in the liturgies—after all, it's our baptismal right and duty! But what does active participation mean? It means you focus on Christ during the Mass instead of making a list of what you have to do later. It means you sing the Mass parts and hymns, even if you don't like your voice or a certain song. It means you don't high tail it out the doors before the priest's departs. In essence, it means you serve Christ completely, with all your mind, with all your soul, with all your being, and with all your strength.

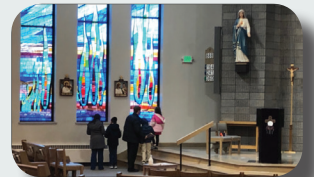

**First Communion:** On Monday, April 4th, we have parent/child learning centers for those preparing for the sacrament. The centers will be open 4:00-7:00pm in Fr. Zenk Hall. Families can expect to take about an hour. Remember to bring your completed Eucharist workbook to turn in.

**Teaching Kids to Care by Practicing Virtues:** During the spring and summer months, we'll be practicing virtues with the assistance of a catechist book by Sr. Janet Schaeffler, OP. This week, we want to look at fortitude, which is one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit and one of the cardinal virtues. Help children learn they will be able to face difficulties and pain and not run from them. Difficulties are part of life. Discuss with your children a time when you managed to get through a tough situation because of courage/fortitude. When difficulties arise, give children encouragement, counsel, and help. Let them know you are there when they need you. Pray together for help and solutions enlisting families, friends and the saints to pray for them. Fortitude is a virtue to practice your entire life.

**Prayer for fortitude:** God of courage, remind us always of the words in Joshua: "Be strong and courageous! Do not fear or be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Guide our decisions and actions as we live the gift of fortitude. Amen.

## Short Prayers — 1 Minute or Less

*To be said in rhythm with your breath or repeated and meditated upon throughout the day.*

1. **The Sign of the Cross** — (Breathe in) In the name of the Father, and the Son, (Breathe Out) and the Holy Spirit. Amen.
2. **The Jesus Prayer** — (Breathe in) Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God (Breathe out) have mercy on me, a sinner.
3. **Mark 9:24** — (Breathe in) I believe (Breathe out) help my unbelief.
4. **Psalm 91:2** — (Breathe in) You are my refuge and fortress (Breathe out) my God in whom I trust.
5. **Psalm 23:1** — (Breathe in) The Lord is my shepherd (Breathe out) there is nothing I lack.
6. **Psalm 27:14** — (Breathe in) Wait for the Lord. (Breathe out) Be strong and take heart.
7. **Psalm 80:3** — (Breathe in) Restore us, O God; (Breathe out) Let your face shine, that we may be saved.

We are mid-lent and sometimes we may find ourselves off track. If so, here are some short 1 minute prayers to help you refocus and get back on track with prayer.
