Weekly Words from The Rock

The Crucifixion of Jesus Christ.

In this Easter season, we have looked at questions from a website entitled Fun Trivia on the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. The following are the answers to the final three questions I posed last week.

Question 1: Holy Thursday, the Day of the Last Supper, is properly known in parts of the world as what Thursday?

- a. Spy Thursday
- b. Maundy Thursday
- c. Chrism Thursday

Answer: B. Maundy Thursday. The word 'Maundy' is derived from the Latin word "mandatum" meaning commandment. Jesus gave a commandment at the Last Supper, "And now I give you a new commandment. As I have loved you, so you must love one another" (John 13:34).

Question 2: On the evening of Jesus' crucifixion, a rich man from Arimathea prepared Jesus' body for burial. His name was WHAT of Arimathea?

- a. John
- b. Joses
- c. Joseph
- c. James

Answer: C. Joseph

Question 3: In the Roman Catholic tradition, which is the only calendar day of the year on which Mass may not be celebrated?

- a. Easter Sunday
- b. Palm Sunday
- c. Good Friday
- d. Holy Thursday

Answer: C. Good Friday. The Mass on Holy Thursday does not conclude with a dismissal. The dismissal happens at the celebration of Easter. Thus, the gathering of God's people on Good Friday is not a Mass rather a service. Because of this, enough hosts must be consecrated on Holy Thursday to distribute for Holy Thursday and Good Friday.

Unleavened Bread.

Question: Regarding the bread that Jesus used at the Last Supper, would it have been unleavened, and if so, what did it look like and how was it made? What is the theological significance of unleavened bread? Answer: It seems clear that Jesus would have used unleavened bread at the Last Supper. The ancient Jews were instructed to use unleavened bread during the feast of Passover. This is scripturally and historically linked to the fact that, in their hasty exodus from Egypt, there was no time to fully knead the dough and allow the bread to rise before baking it (cf. Deuteronomy 16:3). Thus, they baked it quickly without yeast. The Passover meal that commemorated the Exodus was, therefore, to be eaten with unleavened bread (cf. Exodus 29:2, Numbers 9:11).

Theologically, yeast or leaven in the New Testament often is equated with sin, impurity and hypocrisy (cf. Matthew 16:6, Luke 12:1, 1 Corinthians 5:6). Thus, unleavened bread comes to symbolize sincerity, purity and integrity. This, however, is a symbolic meaning, and there is nothing intrinsically evil about leavened bread.

Regarding what the bread was like, we must keep in mind several factors. Wheat bread, which is most common today, was far less common in the ancient world. Breads were more often made from other grains like barley. Second, bread can be baked in such a way that it has a dry, crackerlike quality. Bread also can be baked in a way so that it has a doughy, more pitalike quality. And this is so for both leavened and unleavened bread. Thus other than affirming the bread at the Last Supper was unleavened, we cannot be utterly certain of its other qualities.

Today, however, we must be clear: The Church requires that wheat bread, without any other admixtures, is necessary for the valid celebration of the liturgy.



I once helped organize a two month study at a church where we learned about our faith, discussed it with each other, and were then called out to go forth and teach what we learned to others. I could tell all of us were ready to go out and serve, right up until a parishioner brusquely asked me, "Well, what are you planning on doing next at the church for us?"

Have you often noticed that at some point or another we do not take charge of our baptismal priesthood? It is not just the priest's duty to teach the faith, worship Christ every Sunday during the Mass, or to proclaim the Gospel to those who have stepped away from God. In fact, it is almost impossible for them to do that last part in particular. After all, they are at the church the entire day helping all of us find salvation. Why is it the priest's duty to live out your baptismal priesthood, too?

So let's look at ourselves. What are we doing to exercise our baptismal priesthood? Are we worshiping Christ, especially every single Sunday? Rather, it is all of us as a community that together make up the Church as we actively work to live as Christ's Body here on earth.

So starting this week, I encourage all of us to point the finger back at ourselves and ask, "What am I planning on doing next to serve God and to help others come to know him, too?"
