Weekly Words from The Rock

The Adversary. My motto with hunting has always been I enjoy the chase. With the chase, I only hunt that in which I find myself living. Bear, moose and elk do not fascinate me as I have to travel to take up the chase. Growing up, there was nary a turkey around Freeborn but with my assignments in Lewiston and Rochester, I promised to be true to my identity; they existed where I lived so it was time for Mr. Turkey to take notice.

Before I began the chase after turkey in southeast Minnesota, I first ventured into the deer blind chasing whitetails around the bluffs of the region. It was from that experience that I learned some things about turkeys:

- 1. They are big. By far, the largest bird I had ever encountered in the woods to date.
- 2. They are noisy. When they fly through the trees, they seem to strike every branch in their path. It is amazing they can even reach a destination.
- 3. I had always heard about how difficult they were to hunt. I found that hard to believe deer hunting. I could be sitting in blaze orange and they would walk right past me.

With these life lessons, I thought that bagging a turkey would be a snap. I had some things to learn. First, I hunt turkeys in the spring. One can hunt turkeys in the fall however I am usually after different fowl in the fall months. Hunting in the spring means you can only take toms and jakes. Hen turkeys are off limits. Of course, most of the birds in the woods are hens so while you see turkeys, the vast numbers are off limits.

Second, I could never figure out how one could set up a ground blind tent the morning of the hunt and a turkey wouldn't be spooked. Deer are much more cautious to ground blinds. It is wise to set up a ground blind days in advance of deer hunting. Not so with turkeys. However it doesn't mean you can throw caution to the wind. Be careful of sudden movements within the blind.

Third, you better know how to call. Not every turkey in the woods sounds the same. If you can't call, you have just upped the odds in the turkey's favor. Call poorly and the odds are you may never see the bird you are chasing.

And finally, turkeys don't have a high IQ. In fact, there brains are no larger than the size of a marble. The greatest lesson I have learned with turkeys is they are highly sensitive to any slight movement or sound. Any turkey hunter can share a story about being left wondering "how could a turkey have seen that." The slightest move of your foot or hand and a turkey will head for the next county. Turkeys also have remarkable hearing. A person can call at a turkey a half mile away and the turkey can hear as if standing right next to you. Thus, speak or whisper too loudly and you are going home with nothing in the bag.

As Christians, our greatest adversary is the devil. Some things I have learned:

- 1. The devil isn't a fool. In fact, I have made mention of this previously and do so once again. Do not, do not, do not try to outsmart the devil, outwit the devil, or outthink the devil. That leads to problems, big problems. Ask Adam and Eve.
- 2. The devil doesn't sleep. Whether morning, afternoon, evening, or night, the devil is there lurking, trying to steal another soul.
- 3. The devil hates God. The devil hates Mary. Stories are told of how the devil refuses to call Mary by her name, preferring to refer to her as "that woman."
- 4. The devil isn't out to try and make a friend. To think that the devil wants us to follow him because he cares about us or loves us is foolhardy. The devil only has one goal in mind: our destruction and the destruction of anything which has to do with God.

In all of this, remember one thing: the devil isn't all powerful. The devil isn't greater than God. Such is the message of Easter. What we need to do is stay in touch with God. Prayer, sacraments, living a moral life all leads to a path of life. Such a path is one the devil despises. So live it and lead it every day until God calls you (and me) home.



Teaching Kids to Care by Practicing Virtues: We will spend the spring and summer months talking about virtues with the assistance of a catechist book by Sr. Janet Schaeffler, OP.

This week we will practice being humble. Humility is the quality of an unassuming attitude, of not thinking you are better than other people. Our goal is to see ourselves and others as God sees us.

As C. S. Lewis said, "Humility is not thinking less of yourself, but thinking of yourself less."

Since humility comes from a position of strength and self-assurance, we can teach children about humility by helping them to feel good about themselves. Encourage them to be the very best they can be— no matter what they do. Activities that foster cooperation can foster humility. Help your children to take satisfaction rather than pride in their accomplishments. When children perform well or achieve a goal, it's good for them to feel the joy that comes from a job well done, without arrogance or disrespect of others. Along with this comes mistakes and failures. These are both teaching moments for children, who need to understand we are loved and valued no matter what.

Prayer for humility: Humble God, help us to learn humility; to praise, not criticize; to see the best in others; to learn from mistakes; to ask for help; and to build and not destroy. Amen.
