Weekly Words from The Rock

Father's Day

To all fathers, I would like to wish you a blessed and Happy Father's Day. May God continue to strengthen you in your vocation. Thanks, too, for choosing the gift of life.

Man and Woman's Freedom:

Question: On the solemnity of the Annunciation, I wondered about Mary's "yes" and her choice to agree or refuse God's request. Did she really have a choice? She was conceived without original sin, therefore was she not predestined by God to be the mother of his Son? If she really had a choice, would she have been born without original sin? And what of Judas? Jesus had to be betrayed by one of his disciples to suffer and redeem the world. I believe Judas was also predestined by God to play his part in the redemption of humanity, and I believe, if I ever get to heaven, I will see him sitting with Jesus for having accepted his role.

Answer: Your examples presuppose that God, knowing beforehand what we will do, therefore forces us to do it. But this supposition is wrong. One can imagine that we mere humans may know what is going to happen before it does, but see that our knowledge does not rob the participants of freedom.

Here is such an example: Suppose you are sitting on a hill and see below that two trains are heading toward each other on the same track. Your knowing what is about to happen does not remove the freedom of the engineers. They continue to act freely even though you know what will soon happen.

God's knowledge is surely more sweeping. But the truth remains that we are not programmed or forced to do what God knows we will do. Rather we act freely, and God, who lives outside of time and sees the whole sweep of time at once, has merely set forth his plans in accord with his knowledge of what we will do.

Mary freely said "Yes," and Judas freely said, "No." God, not forcing but knowing their free choices from all eternity, set his plans in accordance with that.

As for your belief that Judas is in heaven, it may be a bit optimistic. The Church does not declare that any particular person is in hell. However, regarding Judas, Jesus said, "The Son of Man indeed goes, but woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed. It would be better for that man if he had never been born" (Matthew 26:24). It is hard to imagine Jesus saying of any human person who makes it to heaven that it would be better never to have been born.

The more likely biblical judgment of Judas is that he died in sin and despaired of God's mercy on God's terms. You are free to hope for a different outcome for him. And while the story of Judas does generate some sympathy by many today, the judgment belongs to God.

Suicide

Continuing with a theme on Judas Iscariot, the gospel of Matthew refers to Judas' suicide. Matthew 27:5 reads, "Flinging the money into the temple, he (Judas Iscariot) departed and went off and hanged himself." Here is a question on suicide: Are people who commit suicide doomed? Should we pray for them?

Answer: While suicide is a grave sin, objectively speaking, the culpability (blameworthiness) of an individual can be reduced, even to a minimum, by severe mental illness that affects their freedom or ability to carefully reflect on what they are doing. Thus, it is proper to pray for those who die by suicide. Physician-assisted suicide is, however, a growing area where many may actually incur full mortal sin by arranging their own death. Presumably, they reflect over a significant period of time and freely plan and execute their own death in violation of the teachings of the Church. Regarding these types of suicide, it is reasonable to be concerned they are, as you term it, "doomed." Still, we should always pray!


Resurrection's Widows Prayer Group

So let us pray this week that we receive the gifts from the Holy Spirit to serve one another through love, for it is only through that love that peace can flourish.




Summer Series: The Sacraments

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Our summer series on the Sacraments continues this week with a

look at Reconciliation. Every year, we have a new group of children and adults who receive the sacrament for the first time. Preparation to receive the sacrament is an important part of knowing and

receiving the love and mercy of God. For the parents, families, and sponsors of these first-timers, it is an opportunity to participate in the sacrament on a deeper level, to return to it after a length of time, or to come to a new spiritual understanding of



Let's look in the Bible to see what God says about forgiveness.

Psalms 32:1-2 "Blessed is the one whose fault is removed, whose sin is forgiven. Blessed is the man to whom the LORD imputes no guilt, in whose spirit is no deceit."

1 John 2:12 "I am writing to you, children, because your sins have been forgiven for his name's sake."

Luke 17:3-4 "If your brother sins, rebuke him; and if he repents, forgive him. And if he wrongs you seven times in one day and returns to you seven times saying, 'I am sorry,' you should forgive him."

Here's what the Sacrament of Reconciliation actually offers:

- restoration to honesty—no more need to rationalize
- restoration to integrity—no more need to have secret or unacknowledged parts of your life
- relief from unproductive guilt—transformation of remorse into living a new life
- an encounter with God—meeting God in humility (not humiliation!) and weakness
- spiritual guidance—no need to struggle with your moral issues alone
- inner peace—no longer having to live a life at war with yourself
- strength in meeting future challenges and temptations
- grace—rediscovering, as did the prodigal son, your Father's unconditional love.
