Read slowly one of the following quotes and write in your prayer journal about what strikes you about the quote and how it relates to you personally. Pray for understanding and the grace to respond to God's call. "Living our Baptism to the full... also means not accustoming ourselves to the situations of degradation and misery that we encounter as we walk along the streets of our cities and towns... We become accustomed to brothers and sisters sleeping on the streets, who have no roof to shelter them. We become accustomed to refugees seeking freedom and dignity, who are not received as they ought to be. Lent comes to us as a providential time to change course, to recover the ability to react to the reality of evil which always challenges us.

"Love of God and love of neighbor have become one: in the least of our brethren we find Jesus himself, and in Jesus we find God." Benedict XVI, Deus caritas est, no. 15

Lent is to be lived as a time of conversion, as a time of renewal for individuals and communities, by drawing close to God and by trustfully adhering to the Gospel. In this way, it also allows us to look with new eyes at our brothers and sisters and their needs." - Pope Francis, General Audience, 3/5/14



Summer Series: The Sacraments

The Sacrament of the Eucharist

Our summer series on the Sacraments continues this week with a look at the Eucharist. The Mass is often referred to as the Eucharist, which means "thanksgiving."

"The celebration of Mass is the center of the whole Christian life. All other liturgical Rites and all the works of the Christian life are linked to the Eucharistic celebration, flow from it, and have it as their end."

General Instructions on the Roman Missal

When we come together to celebrate the Eucharist, it is an invitation to love Christ and one another. We remember that the Eucharist is a symbol of our oneness with Jesus, a celebration for all people, all over the world. It is a sign of Jesus within us and one another. At Mass, the priest says the same words that Jesus spoke to his Apostles at the Last Supper. This is when the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ.

"And as they were eating, he took bread, and blessed, and broke it, and gave it to them, and said, "Take; this is my body." And he took a cup, and when he had given thanks he gave it to them, and they all drank of it. And he said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many." Mark 14:22-24
