Weekly Words from The Rock

Answer to our Question on the 12 Apostles

We looked last week at the various ways the apostles died. Their stories are amazing, facing immense persecution and suffering. Here are some of their stories:

1. Andrew – died on an X-shaped cross
2. Bartholomew – died by being flayed alive then beheaded
3. James the Greater – died by beheading
4. James the Lesser – one tradition states he died by being stoned to death. A second states he was clubbed with a fuller's pole. A third he was taken to the pinnacle of the temple and hurled to the ground then stoned.
5. Jude – died by being shot to death with arrows
6. Matthew – Died by being slain by a sword
7. Matthias – Died by being stoned then beheaded
8. Philip – One tradition states he died of natural causes. Another he was beheaded. A third by being stoned. A fourth by being crucified upside down. We really do not know.
9. Simon the Zealot – One tradition states he died by old age. Another he was sawed in half. Another he was crucified.
10. Thomas – Died by being stabbed with spears

With the story of ten of the apostles laid out for us, we are left with three of the original apostles. The question I asked us to reflect upon for the week was, how did the following apostles die?

- A. St. Peter
- B. St. John
- C. Judas Iscariot

Let us look at each.

- A. St. Peter deemed himself unworthy to die the same way as Jesus Christ. His request? He asked to be crucified upside down.
- B. St. John was challenged to drink a chalice of poison. He blessed it, whereupon a dragon-form of Satan flew from it and he drank it without harm.

Also, he was immersed in boiling oil but delivered unharmed. Finally, he was banished to the island of Patmos and died by natural causes.

- C. Judas Iscariot felt a deep guilt about having betrayed Jesus and died by suicide.

8 Reasons to Go to Mass

I am not certain who wrote this article however I have kept it for a period of several years. Sometimes we may be asked, why go to Mass? Over the next weeks, I will present the eight reasons. We look at the first two today.

Reason 1. The Third of the Ten Commandments given to Moses by God is, "Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day" (Exodus 20:8). We attend Mass because it is a "direct order" from God.

Reason 2. The Mass was instituted at the Last Supper by Jesus Himself on the night before his Crucifixion. The Last Supper was the first Mass. Luke 22:14,19 reads, "When the hour came, he [Jesus] took his place at the table with the apostles... Then he took the bread, blessed it, and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body, which will be given for you. Do this in memory of me.'" When we celebrate the Mass, we repeat the Last Supper, as Jesus commanded us to do. In doing this, we remember and re-present His great act of love for us on the Cross – taking our sins upon Himself so that we, if we follow His commandments, could live with Him forever in heaven.

The humble know themselves as they really are, for they judge themselves as they judge time, by a standard outside themselves, namely, God and His Moral Law."

So last week we talked about who Mary is, that she is gentle, kind, and loving, yet also devoted, brave, and out-spoken. This week, I want to pose the question: why was she all these things?

Answer: because she had hope in Jesus Christ. Even when a wedding ran out of wine, she had so much hope in Jesus that she turned to him. And when Jesus told her his time had not yet come, she still went to the servants and instructed them to listen to Christ, for she was confident in his love for us. She never wavered in her trust. She never wavered in her hope.

Mary's unwavering hope is very different from Judas', though, isn't it? Judas was so fixed on things of this earth, like wealth and prestige, that he lost sight of Christ's love. Notice, Jesus continued to love Judas, so much so that he warned him at the last supper about betraying him. Jesus knew full well that Judas would betray him; after all, he knows us more than we know ourselves, yet he still offered Judas another chance to return to him. But the story doesn't end there. Judas is filled with so much guilt that he loses hope in God altogether. Rather than seeking God's forgiveness, Judas returns the money and hangs himself. Mary and Judas. Two very different lives, two very different stories, all because one had hope, and one did not.

So the next time we face a trial in our life, let's choose to follow Mary's example. Let's remember that God is faithful to his promises, that he is faithful to his mercy, and that his love is everlasting. Let's hope in Jesus Christ.

Starting August 24: Trauma Reboot a nationally utilized Christian program to assist those who have experienced trauma in their past and present time. The diocese has chosen to pilot this healing process during the stresses of the pandemic as a faith-based approach to assist our people in healing from financial, relationship, employment and illness stressors.

The program begins Wednesday, August 24th, 6:15pm at St. James Coffee. It occurs each Wednesday for 12 weeks with light refreshments, a video presentation, and a led discussion. To be successful, each participant receives a short assignment each week to strengthen their healing. Jesus Christ, the Divine Healer, is present during these sessions.
