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# Weekly Words from The Rock

Celebrating the Four Female Doctors of the Catholic Church

When the word "doctor" comes to mind, we often conceptualize a physician whom we visit to help with our physical needs. I undergo a yearly checkup with a physician who checks my heart, lungs, etc. I am truly grateful to and for all physicians.

The Catholic Church has created categories of saints. Some are self-explanatory – virgins and martyrs need little description. One of the lesser known categories is that of Doctor of the Church. Although the saints who receive the designation of "Doctor" are not better or more important than other saints, this title honors men and women for accomplishing something huge: impacting the Church's theology and with it Her people's understanding of who God is and how they relate to Him.

What does this mean? These saints articulated doctrine and dogma in a way that made sense, that clarified and conceptualized very large and often abstract ideas into ways that everyday people could understand. As important, to be considered for the title Doctor of the Church, it must be proven that a saint's contributions are both orthodox and unique — that they provide fresh insights into Catholic teaching and doctrine that are both applicable and needed in their own time period and also timeless, remaining true and helpful to Catholics for future generations.

To be considered a Doctor of the Church, a person must meet three criteria:

- 1. The person must be of exemplary holiness.
- 2. They must have contributed substantially to the Church's theology and moral life through their writing, research or speaking.
- 3. They must be declared a Doctor by either a full Church council or by papal decree.

To date, there are 37 saints with the title of "Doctor" and four of these are women.

With all of this before us, let us look at our first female doctor of the Church. St. Hildegard of Bingen was born to a noble family in the year 1098. Even as a child, she had mystical visions of the Lord, though it wasn't until she was older that she was able to understand the meaning of them all. As a young woman, she entered religious life, and it was here that her talents truly exploded. St. Hildegard was a woman who did everything and did it well.

At age 43, she sought the advice of her spiritual director about her visions, and their authenticity was declared by a committee of Church theologians. This led her to write them and their meanings down in her great mystical work, "The Scivias." It also allowed her to seek and receive permission from the pope to travel and evangelize, making her one of the only women of her time to be allowed to preach publicly. An enduring theme in St. Hildegard's theology is the ability to find God through the use of our senses.

In addition, the prolific Hildegard wrote the first known morality play, lyrical poetry, a cookbook, medical treatises (she was also the equivalent of a medical doctor in her time), and even came up with her own language. She also composed beautiful music, which is played by orchestras around the world to this very day.

St. Hildegard died in 1179. She was canonized in 2012 by Pope Benedict XVI and declared a Doctor of the Church the same year.

I still have some books available. They can be picked up at the parish office.


Feel free to come and get a fresh start on the Bible with a new perspective of just how we got the Word of God handed to us over time.

Back in seventh grade, I cantored at a funeral for the first time, and soon after most of the parishes in town were hiring me to sing at them. The more I sang at these funerals, the more I wanted to talk about them with other people so I could better understand what death truly meant. But I had difficulty finding other people eager to converse with me. In fact, most were unnerved by my questions, not wanting to even think about the subject. Others were concerned my questions were not mentally healthy.

See, death is a word our society as a whole fears? It seems final, unknown. We know death involves mourning and losing someone we love dearly. And certainly it is a time to mourn. But through our faith, we know it's also a time to rejoice.

Death is one of the very foundations of our faith, for without death, we cannot have the Resurrection. Only through death can we find new life in our Savior, Jesus Christ. Because of Jesus, death is not final, only a transition for us into everlasting life. That is why the priest wears white vestments at a funeral, why a white cloth is placed over the casket, why we light the paschal candle, and why we sprinkle the casket with holy water. All of these actions are symbols of the new life God offers us through baptism. That's why we continue to pray for departed souls, too, because we know that they are still and forever living through Christ. Death is no longer the end, only the beginning.

Even if you have not yet been in a position where you've had to think about planning a funeral, it's important that all of us take time to talk about it. I therefore invite you to join me and our other presenters for our Through Death to Life event at Resurrection on Saturday, November 5 from 1-3pm. After the talks, we'd be happy to talk with you more about this subject.
