Weekly Words from The Rock

Celebrating the Four Female Doctors of the Catholic Church. To date, we have looked at two of the four female doctors of the church. This week I want to share with you the story of the third of our four doctors.

St. Therese of Lisieux was born the youngest of nine children (five who survived childhood). After her mother died when Therese was 4, she was raised by her father and older sister.

She knew that God was calling her to religious life at a very young age and was so determined to follow several of her older sisters and enter the Carmelite order that, during a papal audience while on a pilgrimage to Rome with her father, she asked the pope to grant her special permission to profess her vows early. Undeterred by his no, she entered Carmel at the young age of 15 and never looked back.

Therese struggled with scrupulosity and depression, but through it all she maintained a deep and childlike faith in the Father's love for her that would become the cornerstone of her great theological work. Under the order of the prioress, Therese wrote down her doctrine of faith, "Story of a Soul." It is this book, which preaches holiness through the ordinary combined with a fearless faith that allowed her total trust and surrender to God, that would later propel her to become the youngest of all the Doctors of the Church

Therese died at the tender age of 24 of tuberculosis. She was canonized in 1925.

The last time I went to the Guadalupe Shrine in La Crosse, I wasn't planning on staying long. My foot was still injured and I felt exhausted. I therefore went straight for the confession line when I arrived at 11:40. At 11:50, I realized that no one had walked out of the confessional since I got there. At 12:00, those of us in line were wondering if there was even anyone in the confessional. At 12:14, Mass began with twelve people awkwardly standing off to the side, wondering what to do. Finally, at 12:15, a person walked out of the confessional, and the next person walked in. Thankfully, his confession was much faster—and by faster, I mean it only lasted 20 minutes. When Mass ended, the celebrant took pity on us and opened up another confessional. As I left at 1:15, I chuckled, knowing that my short trip took the same time, if not longer than my usual visits.

But the whole time, I asked myself why I continued to wait in line, especially when my foot gave me so much grief that I had to sit down on the floor. But my answer remained the same: I was and still am in need of Christ. Waiting for almost two hours to receive his grace is nothing compared to the mercy and salvation I find in our Savior, Jesus Christ. Even more heartening, I knew the others who waited in line felt the same way. Out of the twelve of us who waited in line, only two left early. Even a father and his two small children waited patiently for the mother to receive the sacrament she clearly and sincerely desired.

All of us are in need of salvation. We cannot find it without Jesus Christ. We all need to hear this, especially when we come up with excuses not to receive the sacrament of Reconciliation. In these times, I encourage you to remember this story and think about those people who stood in line beside me with no other desire than to receive his forgiveness. I am sure in that moment they would have done anything to receive it—can we all say the same?
